Canada faces a growing sight loss crisis.

An estimated 1.5 million Canadians identify as having sight loss, and roughly 5.5 million are living with one of the four major eye diseases cataracts, diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, or age-related macular degeneration - and are at risk of losing their sight if they haven't already. These numbers are only expected to grow as Canada's population ages.

Empowering Canadians Impacted by Blindness

Why I'm Leaving a Legacy

Deciding to leave a legacy gift was an easy decision for Shep Shell, a long-time CNIB supporter and volunteer.

"At some point, I began to wonder how could I, a person with limited financial resources, make a more tangible contribution?

I chose to purchase a life insurance policy where the premiums are tax deductible and I am provided with a tax receipt each year," he explains. "This allows me to leave a substantial amount to CNIB without burdening me financially in life."

The process of leaving a legacy gift was seamless and straightforward for Shep - and a meaningful way to give back to the organization that has been an integral part of his life for more than 50 years.

Shep - who was born blind - fervently believes in the importance of dreaming and working to achieve those dreams, no matter what challenges in life you face. With CNIB's support over the decades, he has realized many of his own dreams, including marathon running and becoming a motivational speaker.

"I'm very comfortable with my decision and grateful that this way of supporting an organization that's important to me is available," Shep says.





Each program provides an opportunity for limitless possibilities, providing individuals with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to smash barriers in pursuit of the life they choose. Here are just a few of our empowering programs – all made possible because of supporters like you:





CNIB Guide Dogs

CNIB is the only organization in Canada that raises, trains, and matches dogs exclusively for people with sight loss. Being part of a guide dog team provides mobility, safety, and confidence to people who are blind or partially sighted, leading to increased independence and a sense of connection with the world.





Children & Youth

Growing up with sight loss can bring practical, emotional, and social challenges. Our children and youth programs help with

navigating these developmental stages through pre-employment skills training, peer support groups, music therapy sessions, and more.





Braille & Literacy

For 100 years, CNIB has been providing braille services and courses to people impacted by blindness. Being able to read

and write braille is the key to literacy, successful employment, and independence for people with sight loss of all ages. The independence of reading a braille agenda in a meeting, floors on elevator buttons, signs, menus, and even a letter in privacy, shows how crucial braille literacy is.



Inspired by her love of dogs, and a personal connection to family members with sight loss, Donna's late mother, Dorothy, decided to leave a gift in her will to sponsor this little puppy with purpose.

Dorrie, named after both the fishing boats in the East Coast and Donna's mother, will spend the next two years training to become a future CNIB Guide Dog. Once her training is complete, she'll provide the ultimate gift for a Canadian with sight loss – one of safety and independence.



In the fall, Donna and siblings, lan and Heather, had the chance to meet Dorrie in person. "Dorrie was just so sweet," Donna says as she reflects on the memory. "I could tell that both my brother and my sister truly enjoyed it. We've all gone through some difficult times recently – and this was such a wonderful experience to share together."

When Donna reflects on the experience of working with CNIB, she expresses her gratitude for the support, kindness, and thanks she received from the planned giving team along the way. "I'm so thankful," she says. [The team] is so committed to the families of donors and benefactors – and in

letting them know exactly how their gift is making an impact.

"For me, this whole experience has made a meaningful difference all around," she explains. Sample Bequest Clauses

You may wish to leave all or part of the remainder (residue) of your estate (a specified percentage): "I deliver, pay, or transfer _____% of the residue of my Estate to The Canadian National Institute for the Blind."

You may wish to leave a specific bequest (a specific dollar amount):

"I deliver, pay, or transfer the sum of ____ dollars [\$] to The Canadian National Institute for the Blind."

Should you wish to designate your gift to a specific location or for a specific use, you should add: "It is my preference that this gift be used for ."
